



HGGS FORUM 2023



Last July, I had the chance to travel with my supervisor Prof. Daniela Landert to the biannual IPrA (International Pragmatics Association) conference, which took part at the Université Libre de Bruxelles campus in Brussels. This conference is the largest international gathering of researchers interested in pragmatics, the study of language in context. This event opens up multiple possibilities for interdisciplinary exchange, with academics in neighboring fields such as psychology and philosophy also participating.

During the conference, I had the opportunity to listen to talks delivered by leading experts in the discipline of pragmatics, like Stephen Levinson, as well as to attend panels from presenters who are at the moment exploring similar research avenues to mine, such as Prof. Jonathan Culpeper from the University of Lancaster. The highlight of my stay in Brussels came on the fourth day, when I was part of the poster session that was held at the venue. During this session, I put on display a poster summarizing the design of the study I am conducting for my PhD, which focuses on cross-cultural variation in the production of impolite utterances by speakers of British English and Peninsular Spanish in the context of card game interactions. I received a wide range of guestions and comments from many attendees, some of which have led to my reformulating or redefining some aspects of my research project.



In November 2022,I worked as a technical interpreter for the Japan Foundation at the event "Dumb Type | Audio Visual Live 2022: remix" at Teatro Goldoni, Venice, Italy. I was one of the main organizers of the International MA Symposium in Transcultural Studies "Construction and Contestation: Counterculturality from Transcultural Perspectives" held in February 2023 at Heidelberg University. March 3nd-4th 2023: I presented at the 3rd International Doctoral Symposium on Asian and African Studies at La Sapienza University in Rome. The title of my presentation was "A Beautiful King Arthur: An Examination of Nyotaika in the Visual Novel Fate/Stay Night".

Together with a research scholar, Zifei Wang, and other HGGS students, I started the reading group "Body, Crossings(https://www.hggs.uni-heidelberg.de/mentoring.html). As the new semester starts, we will resume our activities and hope for the participation of new students. As soon as we have decided the new plan for the semester, I will send additional information.

In mid-September 2023, I started my research period abroad in Kyoto, in affiliation with Kyoto University's Graduate School of Letters, thanks to a Japan Foundation Fellowship. The research period will end on August 2024, and during these eleven months abroad I will conduct fieldwork and interviews with drag performers and artists in Club Metro, Kyoto, and possibly in the Kansai area in general. In October 2023 I presented my PhD project at The Japan Foundation Fellow Conference at the International Research Center for Japanese Studies (Nichibunken) in Kyoto. The title of my presentation was "Diamonds in the Subway: Analyzing Gender in Contemporary Japanese Society through the Drag of Club Metro, Kyoto".



Leaving one's comfort zone – My Conference experiences from 2022 and 2023 abroad and at home and researching in the USA

During my US-stay from February 2022 to August 2022, I took the one-time chance to convene and to come together with internationally renowned scholars of my field, presenting my own research and making connections for future collaborations, as well as experiencing first hand a different academic culture. I soon realized that Americans are quite approachable and keen on welcoming young researchers from abroad to their country. On the other hand, though, I also learned to appreciate the advantages that European countries have got ahead to the USA - think of, e.g., less political polarization, less gun-violence, less economic and social inequality – I could go on. Aside from my archival investigations into the intellectual inheritances of John Dewey and Hannah Arendt, making extensive use of their unpublished manuscripts, journals and notes, as well as their substantial private libraries, I explored the Midwest and East Coast-regions, as well as the West Coast during my private travels - a very illuminating and invigorating experience, indeed. In fact, never before - and after that - did I receive such a warm welcome: On the very day of my arrival at Southern Illinois University at Carbondale (SIUC), I already could come together with professors from faculty and invited guests for dinner - one of the professors actually invited me and my professor in the US to breakfast into his private home the next day for German standards, this is extremely friendly. Needless to say that my stay abroad also was very helpful with accustoming me again to a life not affected by Covid-19regulations, as the USA in 2022 were very quick in dropping any Covid-19-related restrictions of public and cultural life. After having made myself at home in Carbondale, Illinois, I was invited spontaneously to a conference, having gotten the opportunity to also present the preliminary findings of my archival investigations.
