The Faculty of Psychology at the University of Havana opens its doors to the XIV edition of the International Meeting of Psychology Students, which will be held in Havana from October 26th to 30th, 2026.

The **International Meetings of Psychology Students** began in the year 2000, in a context of many changes and significant events for Cuba. Psychology took to the streets: to listen, to research, and to make visible its role for social well-being and the transformation of spaces. At the School of Psychology at the University of Havana, Professor Reynaldo Rojas had a powerful vision: to create international meetings as a space for **dialogue, cooperation, and collective construction** of psychology.

Since then, every two years, Havana welcomes students from more than 20 countries in a Meeting **made by and for students**. The uniqueness of its name denotes what sets it apart: the intention to build in each edition a **space to interact and share knowledge** among **students and professionals** of psychology and related sciences.

With more than two decades of history, connections, and learning, the International Meeting of Psychology Students is a unique experience. For **students**, it represents an opportunity to enrich their curriculum, learn from important figures in psychology, discover diverse perspectives, present their formative experiences, and establish professional relationships. 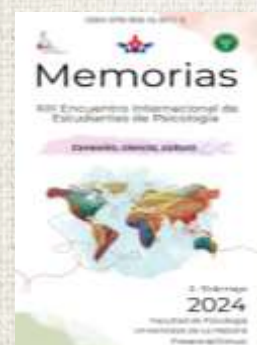

Important Dates:

- Registration opening and paper submission: [February 2026](#)
- Abstract submission deadline: September 15th, 2026
- Abstract evaluation: within a maximum of [15 days after](#) submission.
- Deadline to register for your paper to appear in the scientific program: [October 15th, 2026](#).

Abstract Submission:

- All abstracts will be evaluated by a Scientific Commission.
- Contributions may be submitted in Spanish, English, Portuguese or French, with no simultaneous translation service.
- Only registered participants will receive a presentation certificate.
- All abstracts will be published in the event's memoirs (with ISBN).
- Abstracts must be submitted through our [website](#).

Abstract Structure:

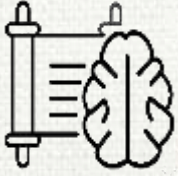
- [Title](#): Maximum 15 words, without quotation marks or capital letters except for the first letter and proper nouns.
- [Extended abstract](#): Must contain necessary information between 1500 and 3000 characters with spaces, with the following sections:
 - Empirical research: Introduction, Objectives, Methods, Results, and Conclusion. Should not include references.
 - Non-empirical research: Introduction, Objectives, Topics addressed, Conclusion.
- [Keywords](#): 3 to 5 separated by commas.
- [Special assistance](#): Indicate if you need assistance for the presentation (e.g., sign language interpretation or subtitles).

modalities

- **Free Contribution:** Presentation of completed or ongoing research. In the scientific program, they will be grouped into thematic panels. Each panel will last around one hour.
- **Symposium:** A space where different researchers in a specific field meet to discuss and analyze aspects or problems from different perspectives on the topic addressed. Duration: 60 minutes.
- **Poster:** Graphic presentation of work results. Completed work, ongoing projects, pre-professional practice experiences may be presented. They will be available in sessions distributed during the event week in a space at the venue.
- **Workshop:** Space for collective construction on a topic, where knowledge is fostered through practice. Methodologies, methods, or work techniques on the topic are shared. Duration: 120 minutes.
- **Project at the Grand Community Fair:** A scientific dissemination project designed for a specific audience, with the aim of interacting with the community. It will be presented during the Grand Community Fair.

The Cientific Comitee could recommend a change of modality or thematic área in accordance to the Scientific Program demands.

1. Foundations of Psychology: Epistemology, History and Methodology:

- History and evolution of theoretical currents in psychology.
- Contemporary epistemological debates: science, pseudoscience, and disciplinary limits.
- Critical, feminist, decolonial, and Community psychologies.
- Ethics in research and professional practice.
- Methodological innovation: artificial intelligence, big data, machine learning applied to psychological research.
- Mixed methods, advanced qualitative analysis, and open science.

2. Legal, Forensic and Criminological Psychology:

- Forensic psychological assessment.
- Psychology of testimony and evidence.
- Care and intervention with crime victims.
- Criminal and criminological psychology.
- Interpersonal violence in legal contexts: intimate partner violence, domestic violence, risk assessment, and protection measures.
- Delinquency and associated factors.
- Penitentiary psychology and social reintegration.
- Restorative justice and alternatives to the punitive system.
- Psychology applied to family law.

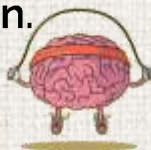
3. Gender, Sexualities and Contemporary Family Configurations:

- Gender studies: theories, methodologies, and applications in psychological research and intervention.
- Construction of gender identities and sexual-affective diversity.
- Sexual and reproductive health: sex education, reproductive rights, and STI prevention.
- Sexuality in old age and affective bonds in older adulthood.
- Gender-based violence: intimate partner violence, dating violence, femicides, sexual violence.
- Contemporary family configurations: homoparental, single-parent, reconstituted families, maternities, paternities, co-parenting, and care roles.
- Couple dynamics and affective bonds.
- Public policies on gender, sexuality, and family.



4. Sports Psychology and Physical Activity:

- Sports performance psychology.
- Sports motivation and exercise adherence.
- Psychological processes in competition: competitive anxiety, stress, psychological pressure, concentration, and activation.
- Group dynamics in sports.
- Physical exercise and mental health.
- Body image in sports contexts: eating disorders in athletes, muscle dysmorphia, aesthetic pressure.
- Sports injuries and transitions: psychological impact, recovery, sports retirement, and career reconversion.

5. Cyberpsychology, Digital Technologies and Contemporary Subjectivities:

- Problematic use of internet, social networks, and mobile devices.
- Video games: psychological impact, cognitive benefits, and gaming disorder.
- Digital identity, online self-construction, and self-presentation on social media.
- Forms of violence in the digital environment.
- Technology-mediated social relationships and bonds in digital environments.
- Technology-mediated psychological interventions.
- Artificial intelligence in psychology: therapeutic chatbots, assisted diagnosis, limits, and ethical considerations.
- Critical digital literacy.
- Psychology of online communities and social media behavior.



6. Organizational Psychology, Work and Human Management:

- Human talent management.
- Leadership in the organizational context.
- Climate and organizational culture, engagement, and job satisfaction.
- Mental health at work and prevention of psychosocial risks.
- New work modalities: telework, hybrid work, virtual teams.
- Entrepreneurship and psychology of the entrepreneur.
- Corporate social responsibility and sustainable organizations.
- Organizational change and development.

7. Clinical Psychology, Mental Health and Comprehensive Wellbeing:

- Psychotherapeutic models, psychopathology, and intervention techniques; therapeutic approaches, emotional disorders, mood disorders, anxiety, depression, psychosis, personality disorders..

- Studies on addictions and addictive behaviors.
- Prevention and intervention in suicidal behavior.
- Health psychology and chronic diseases: therapeutic adherence, coping, quality of life, and chronic pain.
- Psychooncology and palliative care.
- Clinical assessment and diagnosis: instruments, psychological evaluation processes, case formulation.



8. Developmental Psychology and Education of Subjectivities:

- Development throughout the life cycle: childhood, adolescence, adulthood, and active aging.
- Gerontechnology and digital aging.
- Intergenerational relations and cultural transmission.
- Learning processes: motivation, metacognition, and self-regulation.
- Inclusive education.
- School coexistence and violence in educational contexts.
- Educational technologies in education.
- Media and digital literacy and responsible citizenship.
- Teacher wellbeing, educational burnout, and school climate.

9. Social Psychology, Community and Collective Processes:

- Social identity, categorization, and intergroup relations.
- Political psychology: citizen participation, social movements, activism.
- Peacebuilding, historical memory, transitional justice, and reconciliation.

- Community and liberation psychology: diagnosis, intervention, and empowerment.
- Environmental psychology and human-environment relationship.
- Religion, spirituality, and construction of meaning.

- Applied neurotechnologies: neuroimaging, neurofeedback, brain stimulation.

venue

The XIV International Meeting of Psychology Students will take place in Havana, Cuba, with the main venue being the Faculty of Psychology at the University of Havana.

The Faculty of Psychology was founded with the creation of the Psychology degree program at the university on January 10th, 1962, when it was established as a School, which in subsequent years consolidated academically and organizationally.



It is located in the Plaza de la Revolución municipality, within the university campus of the University of Havana, which is the oldest higher education institution in the country, founded on January 5th, 1728, and has since consolidated as a symbol of culture and knowledge in Cuba.
